Of all the things that make the month of June special... weddings, anniversaries, birthdays, the first day of summer... Father's Day stands out as a top event. As such, this article is written mostly to the men who are now fathers and to those who might become fathers someday to their own children or to another's by intention or happenstance. Few roles or responsibilities in life equal the joys and heartaches of fatherhood.

In the 15th chapter of the gospel of Luke, Jesus tells the story of a loving father who had two "lost" sons. The younger seems a bit spoiled, bold and overconfident while the older is reserved, committed and well-behaved. As Jesus tells it, the younger son demanded his inheritance earlier than was customary. The father gave in and divided his estate between the boys. With his share the younger son traveled and partied, bought friends and things for as long as it lasted. But without a steady income stream, all too quickly his money ran out. When it did so did his friends.

After going through a most disgusting experience of seriously considering eating the food kept for pigs, he finally came to his senses and headed home. Realizing how foolish and humiliating his behavior had been for his family, he prepared to humbly ask for a job and not to come home as a member of the family.

His father had obviously been watching the road for him to come home because he saw the boy coming while he was still a good distance away. Running to his son the father didn't listen to the carefully prepared speech the boy had practiced every step of the way. He just loved his son.

Later the older son lashed out in anger at his father for letting the younger son come home. The father tried to explain how love directs actions but the older son would not listen. He was lost even though he had never left home. Perhaps someday he too will "come home." The father is patient with the older son also. In his story, Jesus describes God as a loving Father by his response to our foolish, rebellious and selfrighteous actions.

Fathers have the opportunity to experience some of the greatest joys of life and to teach some of the most important life-lessons to their children by being present and involved in the things their children do. All too quickly, children become too grown-up to want "Daddy" with them, so we Daddy's should take advantage of being "Daddy" for as long as possible. It is important for us to be realistic and intentional about our role as parent. God has given us a great opportunity and responsibility with the life of a child. Be fair and generous with your time. Fathers are the first and may well be the only image of God that our children ever see. May you always treasure that privilege and honor that trust.

Dear Pastor,

For some time now, I have struggled with my sinfulness. I feel so distant from God. I just can't seem to let go of my sins and trust that I am forgiven. Nothing has seemed to help me get by this, not even prayer. People offer me advice, but it's like they don't have a clue of what I am going through. And I am embarrassed because I thought that, having been a Christian for so long, I wouldn't be so shaken by this or I would at least know how to deal with it. How do people stay on the straight and narrow?

Dear Stuck,

Without knowing what sins you speak of, I won't say that I understand exactly how you feel or that I know the pain you have experienced. What I can tell you is that while your path is new to you, many great Christians have travelled similar paths. Even Mother Teresa and St. John of the Cross described experiencing a darkness and hopelessness in their lives. I doubt anyone truly seeking Christ escapes these moments, especially veteran believers. And just because people seem to have it together doesn't always mean that they do. The fact is that we all struggle. We are tried, tested, tempted and attacked on a daily basis. While I don't know your struggles, maybe sharing mine will help you better understand yours. At the very least, you'll know that you aren't the only one who struggles and if, by God's grace, that helps you then I will be greatly blessed and honored.

At times more often than I care to admit, I am guilty of believing all of the following things about myself: I am not good enough, smart enough, strong enough, fit enough, healthy enough, disciplined enough or fast enough. I am not attractive. I eat too much. I sleep too much. I watch too much TV. I waste too much time. I put things off too long. I worry too much. I over think and analyze things too much. I am too hard on myself. I expect too much from myself. I don't read enough, study enough, learn enough, give enough, pray enough, or fast enough. I don't spend time with God as I know I should. I talk more than I listen, hurt more than I help and judge more than I forgive. I label people before understanding them, write people off as too much of a hassle rather than open myself to learning from them. I am idle. I sin, a lot. I lust, I hate, I curse under my breath, and I am really quick to be angry. I am jealous of others, envious and egotistical, laced with a sense of entitlement to the things that the world does not reward me. I am far from humble, closer to being completely selfish. I am most concerned with what I want, what I lack and what I think I deserve. I am afraid. Afraid of failing, of succeeding, of growing, of remaining the same, and afraid that others will see who I really am. I am afraid I won't live up to others' expectations of me. I am afraid that I will disappoint people, that I will disappoint God. I am afraid to fully trust in God, to believe and act upon His word. I am afraid to be alone, that I will always be alone. I am afraid that I will never have a wife or kids and a family of my own. I am afraid that I will have to continually leave the friends I make as I have done when I left high school, college and seminary. I am afraid of following Christ into the hard places, both in ministry and in my heart. I am slow, if not fully resistant to let go of the things I can and cannot control. I rely too heavily upon my own ability and not nearly enough on God's abundance. I am helpless to change. I am empty, unloving, ungrateful and uncaring. I doubt myself, my calling, my faith and my commitment. At best, I am lukewarm. I am a wreck, foolish, broken, unlovable, unworthy and unrepentant. I am afraid that I am alone in my loneliness, that no one else feels or has felt this way. I am afraid all of this makes me unfit for ministry.

I often look at myself in terms of my sinfulness. In reality, the above paragraph is a list of a very, very few of the many things that Christ defeated on the cross. What drives me crazy about the paragraph above is its self-centered orientation. It's "me, me, me" and not God centered. And all that self-centeredness alienates me from others and depresses me, causing me to forget that I am not alone, that I am loved very much, that others have experienced what I am going through, that God helped them turn things around, that God redeemed their brokenness and that He will do the same for me. People who know me might not believe any of that or think me to be crazy for feeling like that, but it's the truth, the ugly truth you have to be able to admit about yourself before real change can begin. You first must believe that you need redemption before you can truly believe that you have been redeemed. Likewise, you must believe that you have accepted God's grace before you can feel its effect. And I believe Christ fully knows each and every one of your pains, fears, sufferings, and sins because he died for them in order to keep you from being enslaved to them. And Christ said, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." (2 Cor. 12:9) So, we ought to let go of our pride that tells us that our hurt and brokenness is all our own and that we have to fix it on our own. Also, we should accept his grace by responding to his call when he said, "Come to me, all you who are weary and heavy laden, and I will give you rest." (Matt. 11:28) His burden is easy, and his yoke is light. I hope that in time, you will see that you need not carry your burdens because He has already carried them for you.

ORGAN RECITAL

Cristiano Rizzotto will present a program of sacred music at First United Methodist Church on Sunday, June 24, at 3pm, in the sanctuary. Born in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, Cristiano holds a Bachelor's Degree in Piano Performance from the Universidade Federal do Rio de Janeiro (UFRJ), where he graduated in 2010, Magna cum Laude.

In Brazil, the organ culture is practically nonexistent, even in a city as large as Rio (approximately 10 pipe organs in a metropolis inhabited by nearly 8 million people), and so is the very existence of the concept of a church musician as a professional. Years before his first lessons, in order to do something about the complete absence of music during the service in the church he attended, and having always been passionate about playing what he considers to be the authentic liturgical instrument, Cristiano decided to volunteer as an organist at St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Lagoa. He later became the organist at Our Lady of Glory Catholic church in Largo do Machado. In the fall semester of 2009, sponsored by the Brazilian government's Ministry of Education, Cristiano attended East Carolina University as an exchange student where he finally had the chance to have real organ lessons and to learn from fine professors at East Carolina University.

Back in Rio, he was nominated the organist of the city's Benedictine Monastery, home of the oldest organ in South America and where the tradition of the chants and liturgy has been kept fresh and alive by the Carioca monks since the 16th century. He returned to the United States last August for a Master's Degree in Sacred Music/Organ, where he studies under Dr. Andrew Scanlon. He is developing his technique and understanding of the instrument and its use in church, and is serving as organist at First United Methodist Church in Washington, NC. Cristiano was awarded the Richard VanSciver Church Music Scholarship in a competition promoted by the Metropolitan Music Ministries in Charlotte, NC this past March.

One of Cristiano's goals is to contribute to the resurrection and development of the organ culture in Brazil, and as long as he is in the USA, to develop his skills as a church musician and contribute to the American liturgical scenery, using his musical gifts to serve and praise the Lord, and also lift up the hearts of members of the congregation.

Have you ever wondered about the bell in our tower? The history committee could not find documentation concerning the bell, so we recruited Pastor Chris to climb up inside the tower to read the inscription on the bell. It reads as follows:

Henry McShane & Co. Baltimore, MD 1881

In 1867 a small wooden church was built on the site of the current sanctuary after the previous (1832) church had been destroyed by fire during the Civil War. The Sanborn maps from 1885 show a free standing bell tower to the West of the church near Second Street. Our bell was apparently moved from the free standing tower to the present tower in 1898 during construction of our current sanctuary.

The McShane Bell Foundry was started in 1856 and is still producing America's finest Church Bells, Chimes and Carillons. Over 300,000 McShane church bells ring out from towers of Cathedrals, Churches, Municipal Buildings, Universities and schools every day, all over the world. The company has been featured on the Television program DIRTY JOBS.

The bell is a stationary bell with the rope pulling the clapper. We have a special bell and very special bell ringers. (look in the black scrapbook in the hall outside the sanctuary to see our ringers).



Parish Health News

"Have mercy on me, Lord, for I am in distress." Psalm 31:9 NIV

for an additional 2.4 million Americans at or over age 40 are currently blind. Vision impairment creates problems for an additional 2.4 million. As Baby Boomers age, these numbers are expected to double. That means this is a problem for all of us. Blindness and visual impairment from many eye diseases and disorders can be reduced when detected and treated early. The leading causes of vision blindness and visual impairment include:

- Diabetic Retinopathy: This common complication of diabetes affects and impairs vision in nearly half of all diabetics to some degree over their lifetime. Blood vessels of the retina can break down, become blocked or leak. Effective treatment includes laser surgery and some medications. Diabetics require annual dilated eye exams.
- Age-Related Macular Degeneration (AMD): AMD is the most common cause of legal blindness and vision impairment in older Americans because it damages central vision. There is no generally accepted treatment, but laser therapies may reduce the risk of further vision loss.
- Cataract: This is the clouding of the lens of the eye and usually appears with advancing age but can be linked to smoking, diabetes and excessive exposure to sunlight. Surgical treatment can eliminate vision loss by replacing the eye's lens.
- Glaucoma: Vision loss is caused by gradual damage to the optic nerve which carries visual information from the eye to the brain. Vision loss is not noticed until significant nerve damage has occurred so screenings are important for early diagnosis when it can be controlled. Any vision loss cannot be restored.

We have a responsibility to care for our eyesight. God has given us our body and the resources to care for it. In I Corinthians 3:16 Paul tells us, "You yourselves are God's temple and...God's spirit lives in you." In verse 9 he says, "You are God's field, God's building." By seeing our eye doctor regularly for vision exams and following our doctor's advice, we become good stewards of our bodies. We use the resources God has given us so we can become the extraordinary servants He intends us to be. (Source: American Foundation for the Blind www.afb.org)
